

I walked past people laughing in the front room, friends cooking in the kitchen, a full table in the sunroom, to a backyard where every single seat was taken at our long folding tables.

That was the moment when I thought to myself, "this ministry is huge."

My Freshman year, Sunday Supper was 20 people meeting in the Crow's Nest, playing Two Ball, and having great conversations. Each weekend, 50-60 people would come to Sunday Mass on campus. We didn't have a house, and our three small groups were held in the DSU. Despite our numbers and lack of "home," the CCM was a place where I came to learn about and grow in my faith, create solid, faithful friendships, and encounter the Lord in His Church. The Catholic Campus Ministry at CNU was small, but it was a place where the Spirit worked, calling college students to become disciples of Jesus Christ.

The CCM at CNU is and will always be my community. It's been the most impactful part of my college experience. I'm so grateful to have found it and to be able to provide that experience to others. As president I pray that we are able to work with the Holy Spirit to evangelize, form, and bring the college students of CNU closer to Christ through holy friendships and authentically Catholic community.

Our Faith Formation Chair, Laura Paquette, was struck by the image of Pontius Pilate speaking to a frenzied crowd, with an innocent, brutalized Jesus next to him. Pilate tells the mob, "Behold, the man!," seeking to release Jesus and be rid of this matter. When they would not be satisfied and accused Him of sedition, Pilate comes back before them with Jesus and says, "Behold, your King!" as he turns Jesus over to be crucified.

The theme of this year's retreat was "Holy Week," with talks on Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday. Each of these days has "Behold!" moments with our Lord placed in front of us for our recognition and worship. Our students were presented with the opportunity to enter into internal meditation on the reality of Christ's identity and call for their lives.

After a Friday evening of talks, fellowship, Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, and the Sacrament of Confession, we awoke on Saturday to walk with the Lord in His creation. We continued to pray and reflect together as we drove to the Shenandoah National Park. There we met Fr. Brian, hiked five miles, and shared a picnic meal together.

Our retreat culminated with the source and summit of all our lives, the celebration of Holy Mass, on top of a beautiful mountain overlook. The prayers of the Church came alive as we knelt in a parking lot in the cathedral of the creation. Behold, our King!
